

While we had been queuing I had noticed that I was about the oldest waiting. Maybe by my age I should have learnt more sense.

We can avoid theme park rollercoasters. It is harder to avoid the twists and turns and loops and ups and downs and being upside downs of life and ministry. The start of 2020 has felt like a bit of a thrill ride. There have been some real highs: welcoming Rebecca as our new circuit administrator, seeing progress on the Radcliffe building project, some unexpected and really exciting possibilities for how we do work in the circuit, great news and signs of growth in so many churches. There have also been times when it has felt like things were turned on their head, not least with the recent vandalism and other intimidation that Cotgrave has faced. As we go into this quarter I can already see some more highs as Radcliffe will complete its building scheme and the plans for ministry in the circuit will develop. It would astonish me if there weren't some challenges along the way.

For those of us at a theme park the words 'hold on tight and enjoy the ride' have a particular relevance. In Christian life the same applies, except instead of holding on to our seat we need to hold onto God. Paul writes to the church in Corinth "all you need to remember is that God will never let you down; he'll never let you be pushed past your limit; he'll always be there to help you come through it."

Finally, for me the rollercoaster will also come to a halt for a bit this quarter as I begin my sabbatical. This gift of space offered by the church to its ministers is an opportunity for rest and new learning. Over the last year I have found it almost impossible to take any uninterrupted time off, and it's probably important for me to stop and regroup. ## News from around the Circuit Keyworth

All our members were invited to attend meetings to hear about the Conference report 'God in love unites us' and for engaging with some of the issues contained in it. There was also opportunity to discuss the report in small groups where individuals could express a view. This was a chance for honest but also respectful conversations. As a result it was felt that more people should have the opportunity to give their feedback. So a box has been provided for people to anonymously offer written feedback. We are seeking 3 comments people may wish to make in response to the report. It may simply be that they agree or do not agree with a particular part of the report. In late February the responses will be collected in and collated.

As is our custom over the Christmas period some of our collections were donated to charities. We held a joint carol service with our Roman Catholic friends when half of the collection was given to Christian Aid. At our Christmas Day service, shared with the Baptist Church, our share was donated to Rainbows Children's Hospice. We also had a Board in the school room where members and friends placed Christmas greeting cards and donated the saving, from sending individual cards, to The Four Homes of Mercy in Palestine.

The Keylink Committee, supporting the charity Harvest Help, held its first fund raising event of 2020 in January with a Team Quiz. It was a good evening and ended up being very competitive – with only a 1/2 mark between the first 3 teams! The evening raised £250. A programme of the remaining events for this year is now available and on the church website

Due to the number of children and young people on Sundays a meeting of existing and potential helpers for crèche, junior and senior church has been held to establish a rota and plan for this year.

Our new prayer zone is now operating. It is available for anyone to use in private prayer or share with someone else after our normal Sunday service.

The popular Keyworth Village Quiz started in January with 27 local groups attempting to lift the Oakley Trophy; donated by one of our members. Our own Church team will see their first match in early February and take on The U3A Pals. The Quiz final will take place at the end of March.

I've just submitted my completed portfolio, some 46 years after I last sent in an essay for marking, but found the time to be well spent as I explored some of the theology around the topic and had time to discuss with others, including the three excellent visiting speakers who brought fresh insights. ## News from around the Circuit Cliff College



Although I was having a great time, by Wednesday afternoon the sunshine and the view across the hills was too much for me and as soon as the afternoon session had finished, I put on my walking boots and headed up the road to Baslow Edge whilst the sun was coming down. On the top of the edge there was more time to sit and reflect before heading back down the hill to **Cliff College**. What a wonderful location in which to study!

I was halfway through my intense week at the Derbyshire college, in the company of some other mature students and a number of young people who were part of 'Cliff Year', a gap year group for 18-25 year olds. The varied group, including several for whom English was not their first language, were interesting and stimulating companions for a week led by Dr Nigel Pimlott and the Senior Tutor and Short Course Director, Ian White, for a Certificate course in 'Social Activism' during last November.

Cliff College Certificates are designed to allow a student to explore a theme in greater depth than a day, mid week or weekend course could allow. The week typically includes 10-12 sessions of teaching, with opportunity for library time and 1-1 tutorials, as well as free time each day and a Cliff College Certificate can be obtained by attendance through the week and the submission of a piece of academic assessment.


